Purpose:

Using Critical Literature to Talk about Bullying

By using children's books that discuss heavy topics, children can relate and bond with the characters.

Not only does relating to the character create a positive experience for the child, but also children can use these character's situations and apply those solutions to their own life. Using literature to address bullying makes the topic about a character instead of singling out one child. In a class or home, children can "identify with fictional characters and bullying situations both at a cognitive and emotional level and gain insight more easily than talking directly about their own experience.

In summary, children will have a better overall understanding of the feelings of everyone involved in a bullying situation. Children who are victims can use these stories to build their own solution to their problems.
